- Essays (1000-2000 words)
 - History, theology, personal essays
 - If you are writing on a specific religious topic, please include 3-5 further readings/links/podcasts which readers might use to deepen their learning. If you need support with this, contact us and we will help locate some.
- Divrei Torah (1000-2000 words)
- Art
 - For Visual art, please submit images between 300 and 600 ppi.
- Poetry
 - We are interested in poetry written in any style, and poems do not need to be explicitly about Hasidic or neo-Hasidic themes.
 - Please submit 3-5 poems.
- Reviews from a neo-Hasidic perspective (book, film, TV, music, etc) (1000 words)
- If something you want to write doesn't fit into this category but you think it would be a good fit, please reach out and pitch it! We don't know what we don't know.

Gender

- Please use Gender-neutral third-person pronouns when speaking of generic people. Unless there is a specific theological point you are trying to make, don't use male pronouns as a default for G-d.

Font

Use Georgia, size 12.

Citation style (if relevant)

 Notes should be used sparingly but should be Chicago-style endnotes when needed.

- For Biblical/Talmudic/Midrashic sources, a parenthetical in-text citation is sufficient.
 - Link to Sefaria whenever possible

Non-English words

- Use whatever transliteration approach to Hebrew and Aramaic feels authentic to you.
- Translate everything parenthetically upon first use
- Consistently italicize non-English words and phrases
